Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival Welcomes Los Angeles-based BODYTRAFFIC for Ted Shawn Theatre Debut

Almanac Dance Circus Theatre, New York Swings, and KanKouran West African

Dance Company Will Perform on the Henry J. Leir Stage

Audiences are invited to participate in Community Dance Celebration

Created by Broadway Choreographer Camille A. Brown

June 19, 2025 (BECKET, Mass.) — Jacob's Pillow will welcome the LA-based contemporary dance company **BODYTRAFFIC** for their Ted Shawn Theatre debut, Wednesday, July 2 through Sunday, July 6. This engagement will occur in the second week of the historic summer festival's nine-week season. Renowned for their "invention, attitude, and urban edge" (*The Boston Globe*), BODYTRAFFIC will offer dynamic performances exploring the power of memory and the unexpected reminders all around us that provoke deep feelings of nostalgia.

Week 2 of the Festival will also feature **Almanac Dance Circus Theatre** for a performance filled with acrobatics, dance and storytelling on the outdoor Henry J. Leir Stage on Wednesday, July 2 at 5:30pm. Also performing on the outdoor stage are **New York Swings** with Lindy Hop dancer Gaby Cook and her signature blend of swing dance and vernacular jazz on Thursday, July 3 at 5:30pm, and **KanKouran West African Dance Company**, with their powerful rhythms and vibrant movement on Friday, July 4 and Saturday, July 5 at 5:30pm.

On Sunday, July 6, Jacob's Pillow will host a Family Music & Dance program at 11am, followed by an open house and community pop-up event to kick off a week-long celebration of the opening of the Doris Duke Theatre. Community members are invited to participate in *Celebration!*, a

celebratory pop-up dance choreographed by Broadway choreographer Camille A. Brown, with check-in for participants starting at 11am. For community members who wish to enjoy the open house but not participate in the dance pop-up, events and tours start at 1pm. Registration for both events is now open at <u>JacobsPillow.org</u>.

A free PillowTalk with Camille A. Brown will also be held on Saturday, July 5 at 4pm. In the talk, Brown will discuss her experience leading her company, Camille A. Brown & Dancers, while building a robust career in theater, opera, and television.

"Week two of our Festival is full of welcome returns," said Jacob's Pillow Executive and Artistic Director Pamela Tatge. "BODYTRAFFIC will have their first performance in the Ted Shawn Theatre, after most recently appearing on our outdoor stage in 2022. They'll reprise their breathtaking work, *Flyland* by David Middendorp that had its US premiere at the gala, and we're excited to welcome Trey McIntyre back to the Pillow with a signature work. We are also thrilled to welcome Gaby Cook in New York Swings, following Cook's memorable performance in our production of *SW!NG OUT* in 2022. Almanac Dance Circus Theatre delighted audiences in 2023, and is now back by popular demand. And KanKouran West African Dance Company also returns for their second festival in a row, with dances and music that audiences in their home city of Washington, D.C. have enjoyed for decades."

All performances are now on sale. Tickets to BODYTRAFFIC begin at \$65. Tickets to all three outdoor engagements this week are Choose What You Pay, allowing ticket buyers to set the price of their purchase. Rain or Shine tickets, priced at \$40 each, allow outdoor ticket holders access to an indoor venue at Jacob's Pillow, which will host outdoor performances in the event of inclement weather.

ABOUT BODYTRAFFIC

With a compelling style that reflects the "invention, attitude, and urban edge" (Boston Globe) of its Los Angeles home, BODYTRAFFIC returns to the Pillow with a program that dives into the power of memory sparked by unexpected reminders. Whether it's a painting, song, or sensation, the associations we make with the world around us forge lasting connections that provoke deep feelings of nostalgia.

For Festival 2025, BODYTRAFFIC will perform a program featuring: *Blue Until June*, set to the songs of Etta James by their new Creative Partner Trey McIntyre; *Flyland*, created by David Middendorp and produced by Another Kind of Blue; Juel D. Lane's *Incense Burning on a*

Saturday Morning: The Maestro, honoring the life and work of painter Ernie Barnes; and I Forgot the Start, created by Philadelphia Ballet choreographer-in-residence Matthew Neenan.

This will be the company's Ted Shawn Theatre debut, having previously performed on the outdoor Henry J. Leir Stage in 2022, and in the original Doris Duke Theatre in 2013 and 2015. Founded in 2007, BODYTRAFFIC tours the country and the globe spreading the joy and positive spirit of their home city. *Dance Magazine* named the company one of "25 to Watch" in 2013, and this past year, *Forbes* magazine wrote that BODYTRAFFIC's "incredible" work in the decade since has "made the case for how Los Angeles is becoming a home for great dancers."

ABOUT KANKOURAN WEST AFRICAN DANCE COMPANY

A beloved pillar of West African dance in Washington, D.C., KanKouran returns to Jacob's Pillow this summer after a thrilling Festival 2024 performance. Founded by Artistic Director Assane Konte and the late Abdou Kounta, the company brings together artists from the United States, Africa, and the Caribbean to preserve and promote traditional West African culture.

For over 40 years, Kankouran has been a cornerstone for generations of dancers, students, and musicians, fostering a deep sense of community and artistic excellence. The company has performed at the Kennedy Center, Lincoln Center, the Brooklyn Academy of Music, and beyond. They now return to the Pillow for two nights to captivate audiences with their powerful rhythms, vibrant movement, and rich cultural heritage.

ABOUT ALMANAC DANCE CIRCUS THEATRE

The award-winning Almanac Dance Circus Theatre returns to the outdoor stage (where they performed in 2023) with a signature blend of acrobatics, dance, and storytelling. Known for pushing artistic boundaries, the company creates genre-defying performances that fuse circus arts with narrative stories, inviting audiences into thrilling, immersive experiences.

With a diverse ensemble of dancers, acrobats, and theater artists, Almanac has premiered 11 full-length works, touring the United States, Mexico, and the United Kingdom. Their daring, improvisational performances have captivated audiences at New York Live Arts, the Philadelphia Museum of Art, and beyond. Also renowned for community-driven events like the acclaimed Cannonball Festival, Almanac continues to expand the possibilities of contemporary circus and dance.

ABOUT NEW YORK SWINGS

Veteran Lindy Hop dancer Gaby Cook returns to Jacob's Pillow this summer, this time bringing her signature blend of swing dance and vernacular jazz to the outdoor stage. A prominent voice in the global Lindy Hop community, Cook shares dynamic performances centered in historical knowledge. Cook is a principal dancer in *SW!NG OUT*, which gave a show-stopping performance in the Ted Shawn Theatre in 2022.

Cook's previous companies include Wild Rhythm Dance Company, which performed at the Pillow in 2018 and 2019, as well as Jazz as Movement (performances with Works & Process at the Guggenheim) and Gatsby Entertainment (performances in the Rainbow Room at Rockefeller Center).

DANCING THE ALGORITHM

Curated by Katherine Helen Fisher, this exhibit features artists whose works illuminate how the dancing body doesn't just adapt to technology, but shapes it, challenges it, and celebrates the new possibilities it creates. CONNECTING THROUGH TIME: 50 SEASONS WITH NORTON OWEN

Curated by Pillow alum Wendy Perron, American dancer and choreographer, dance historian, and former Editor-in-Chief of *Dance Magazine*, this exhibit celebrates Director of Preservation Norton Owen, who for fifty seasons has delved into the past to highlight the present and look

AILEY CONNECTIONS

With connections spanning more than seven decades, the Pillow and Alvin Ailey have been aligned in spirit since two of Ailey's earliest works were performed here in 1954. Encompassing such Ailey icons as Carmen de Lavallade, James Truitte, and Judith Jamison, this exhibition curated by Norton Owen highlights some of the remarkable history that these two landmark dance institutions have shared. *Ted Shawn Theatre Lobby; open Tue-Sun, noon through final curtain.*

Jacob's Pillow Archives/Norton Owen Reading Room

This spacious, informal library and reading room allows visitors to view videos, browse through books, access the Pillow's computer catalog, or peruse permanent collections of Pillow programs and photographs from the Archives. The Reading Room and new Special Collections Room also feature recent donations and more archival treasures from the Stephan Driscoll Collection. *Blake's Barn; open Tues.-Sun., noon through final curtain.*

ABOUT JACOB'S PILLOW

Jacob's Pillow is a National Historic Landmark, recipient of the National Medal of Arts, and home to America's longest-running international dance festival, which celebrates its 93rd season in Summer 2025. Jacob's Pillow acknowledges that it rests on the ancestral homelands of the Muh-he-con-ne-ok or Mohican people. We pay honor and respect to their ancestors and elders past and present as we commit to building a more inclusive and equitable space for all. In addition, we acknowledge the Nipmuc, the Wampanoag and other tribal nations who also made their homes in what is now known as Massachusetts.

Founded by Ted Shawn in 1933, each Festival includes national and international dance companies and free and ticketed performances, talks, tours, classes, exhibits, events, and community programs. The School at Jacob's Pillow, a prestigious professional dance training center, advances the careers of the

upcoming generation of performers and choreographers; during the Festival, 100 international dancers evolve as artists in ballet, choreography, contemporary, musical theatre, tap, and other genres, and year round, artist faculty and accomplished alumni nurture younger dancers in a series of Jacob's Pillow 360 workshops and intensives offered in partnership with leading dance institutions worldwide. The Pillow also provides professional advancement opportunities across disciplines of arts administration, design, video, and production through seasonal internships and a year-round Administrative Fellows program. Through its community engagement programs, the Pillow serves as a partner and active citizen in its local community. The Pillow's extensive Archives, open year-round to the public and highlighted online at danceinteractive.jacobspillow.org, chronicle more than a century of dance in photographs, programs, books, costumes, audiotapes, and videos.

Notable artists who have created or premiered dances at the Pillow include choreographers Antony Tudor, Agnes de Mille, Alvin Ailey, Donald McKayle, Kevin McKenzie, Twyla Tharp, Ralph Lemon, Susan Marshall, Trisha Brown, Ronald K. Brown, Wally Cardona, Andrea Miller, and Trey McIntyre; performed by artists such as Mikhail Baryshnikov, Carmen de Lavallade, Mark Morris, Dame Margot Fonteyn, Edward Villella, Rasta Thomas, and hundreds of others. On March 2, 2011, President Barack Obama honored Jacob's Pillow with a National Medal of Arts, the highest arts award given by the United States Government, making the Pillow the first dance presenting organization to receive this prestigious award.
